A Note from Hazel Bird: On an early fall day Spark, my Corgi-mix and I did just that - we fell early! Still attached by her leash, we sailed down five icy steps to the ground below, she landing on all four feet, I upside down - and my plans, for several weeks to come, were quickly predetermined by circumstances beyond our control. A cast on the writing hand of a person dictates what can be done by that hand and, in this case, very little was accomplished over those lost weeks.

During those weeks, Hazel decided to retire from her bluebird project. Following is a note from her good friend, Audrey Wilson and two notes from bluebirders from the 2004 season.

TRIBUTE TO HAZEL BIRD

In the 1960's Eastern Bluebirds were in big trouble, their numbers declining rapidly.

On March 2, 1968 five carloads of 20 grade 3 and 4 students, their teacher and 9 enthusiastic members of WBFN drove to Harwood to meet Hazel Bird. The children's precious cargo consisted of 25 boxes constructed in class to help the vanishing bluebird. Hazel had already selected good locations to erect these boxes. Whoever would have guessed that the co-operation exhibited that afternoon by all concerned would lead to such great things? The WBFN members wanted to see the idea continued. Hazel graciously stepped forward to co-ordinate and lead the effort and WHAT A GREAT EFFORT it turned out to be, lasting nearly 40 years!

Indeed by the spring of 1969 not only 25 houses but 225 boxes were ready to go! Hazel numbered each box to facilitate accurate record keeping. As each new problem arose, solutions were worked out e.g. predator guards evolved that could outwit even the most clever of feral cats or masked bandits. As early as July 1970, some 96 bluebird nests were recorded. For the ensuing years, Hazel faithfully co-ordinated this program - acting as liaison to local land owners, scheduling volunteers to assist in monitoring the boxes, keeping records and building and locating new boxes as needed. Over the years all these efforts did not go unnoticed. Hazel was the recipient of many well-earned and prestigious awards. However, I am certain her biggest sense of success came in knowing the vanishing bluebird has now become a species listed by COSEWIC as NOT AT RISK!

Here in Canada we are blessed with an abundance of natural resources. But with those resources comes the responsibility to protect and educate at all levels. Hazel has certainly stepped up to the plate in these regards. Fellow members of WBFN take our hats off to Hazel and thank her sincerely for all the devotion, time and effort on behalf of the bluebirds!

Yes, there is a season and a time for everything. Hazel has indicated her decision to retire from this project. She and her many volunteers have achieved what they set out to do in 1968. As we all go forth, continue to be entranced by the Eastern Bluebird, symbol of happiness and hope. Every time we listen to the soft gurgling warble or see the familiar flash of blue we will think of Hazel and her faithful companion "Sparky". Thanks Hazel for a job so well done!

Bluebird Report from Ken and Bea Rauch 2004

We have lived at 9138 Danforth Road East, just on the outskirts of Cobourg since June 2003. We have about 2 acres of lawn, wildflower gardens and mature deciduous trees defining property line on the east and mature deciduous trees about 200 yards behind our property with a field in between the trees and our property. We had not seen any bluebirds the first year we lived here.

March 27 - we put up 3 nesting boxes, 2 "Hazel" boxes and one Peterson box.

April 2 - we saw our first bluebird! It visited all three boxes

April 17 - chose to nest in the Peterson box.

April 26 - 4 bluebird eggs in the Peterson box (#3) and a Tree Swallow in Nest Box #1.

May 3 - we put boxes #4 and #5 in the neighbour's field.

May 11 - bluebirds hatched, and we set up a blind near the box and took photos.

May 11 - swallow eggs in Box #1 - nothing in Box. #2.

May 28 - we were in Ottawa for a few days, and when we returned, the bluebirds had fledged. We discovered at least 3 baby birds in the trees behind our property and the adult birds were feeding them there.

May 28 - swallow nests in Boxes #4 and #5 with eggs. Box #1 still empty.

June 3 - three juvenile birds feeding on our lawn.

June 19 - second family - bluebird box #3 has 4 eggs.

July 1 - two juvenile bluebirds in the bird bath together - about 20 feet from the kitchen window!

July 3 - bluebird eggs hatched - 4 tiny babies and the adults are feeding them.

July 9 - swallows in boxes #4 and #5 fledged.

July 9 - second swallow nest in Box #1. Box #2 still empty although both swallows and bluebirds sit on the roof often.

Between July 10 and July 15 - we took photographs from the blind near the nesting box, and the bluebirds continued feeding the young as we unobtrusively photographed them.

July 12 - Logan, our 2-year-old granddaughter accompanied me to the blind, and was in awe as she observed the bluebirds bring 'bugs' to feed the babies.

July 20 - bluebirds fledged - sitting on house and near-by perches.

We are happy with our first year of blue birding.

June - put up a box at our daughter's in Castleton - cleaned out wren twigs two times - no bluebirds in the box, but we did sight a male on their deck.

July 7 - Henry DeJong has many boxes on his farm on Burns Road near Baltimore and I checked 7 in a row on a fence near the sheep enclosure. Four boxes were empty, one had a wren nest with eggs, one had an empty swallow nest and another had BLUEBIRDS - five baby birds almost ready to fly - both adult birds were nearby.

NORTHUMBERLAND LAND TRUST – A REPORT

On August 19th 2004, the provisional Board of Directors from the Willow Beach Field Naturalist (WBFN) turned over the management of the Northumberland Land Trust (the Trust) to a successor board. After several informal meetings, the new board elected, on October 28th its executive which consisted of; President - Doug Galt, Vice President – Paul Peterson, Secretary/Treasurer – Frankie Liberty and Directors – Brenda Beck, Joan Chalovich, Russell Lake, Bill Logan and Audrey Wilson with Brian Baxter as President of WBFN an ex officio member. Following this meeting a press release announcing the establishment of the Trust was prepared and issued to the media serving Northumberland County. The board was expanded in early 2005 with the addition of Lewis Dunk from the Trent Hills area

As a number of property owners had expressed interest in having their properties protected, it was evident that the Trust had to establish priorities on properties to be considered for either acquisition or establishment of Conservation Easements. Therefore a prioritization workshop attended by the Trust's Board members and other interested parties was held at Victoria Inn on January 15th, 2005. This meeting resulted in the establishment of broad priorities with which the Trust will use for property selection and external relations. At present the Trust is negotiating with a property owner for its first protected piece of land.

Membership in the Trust is now open to individuals interested in protecting and conserving the landscape of the County. The cost of membership is \$20.00 and is valid until January 1st, 2007. The members of WBFN will find membership of interest for as properties are acquired for conservation each will require biological inventorying and on-going monitoring/stewardship. In addition the Trust is a registered charity and anyone considering a donation or a bequest to the Trust can contact any member of the executive.

Whenever it visited or was visiting, and others showed up, it would immediately take a lowered posture and with neck extended it would attempt to spear the surrounding birds, much like a medieval joust.

Monarch News

The overwintering monarch colonies have been measured and the news is bad. In aggregate, the colonies only measure 2.19 hectares. This is the all time low recorded since the monarch overwintering areas became known to science in 1975. There were no new colony sites and all the colonies had low numbers. The largest population, 1.3 hectares (59% of the total), was found at El Rosario, the site most often visited by tourists.

Noted monarch butterfly biologist Dr. Lincoln Brower, who conducted a lecture tour in Ontario last fall and visited Presqu'ile Provincial Park, puts most of the blame for the low numbers of monarchs this year on the loss of monarchs due to the winter storms in

early 2004, the low numbers of monarchs in the spring migration, and the extremely cold summer, but also points to the ongoing degradation of the forests and the extensive illegal logging in several of the core areas of the Reserve.

The good news is that this winter has been favorable for the overwintering monarchs. There has been a generous rainfall in the southern states and milkweed is thriving. Monarch butterflies are now flowing into Texas. Toronto Entomologists Association past president Dr. Phil Schappert, now a professor at the University of Texas, reported his first monarch at Smithville Texas on March 25, 2005



Teacher training courses on using the monarch butterfly in the classroom will be again held in Ontario this July at Kingston and Merrickville . Information about this course and a registration form can be found at:
