ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, FEBRUARY 25, 2005 - PORT HOPE**

**1. Call to Order:** Bryan Baxter called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. at the Port Hope Health Unit. He welcomed everyone and reviewed the agenda. He introduced Past Presidents. Eighty-two people were present.

**2. Annual General Meeting:**

**a. Minutes:** Bryan Baxter reminded everyone that the AGM Minutes of February 27, 2004 were printed in the *Curlew*. Motion to adopt by Jack Goering, seconded by Lawrence Holmes. Carried.

**b. President's Report:** Bryan reminded everyone that this report was printed in the last *Curlew*. He advised Emma Sandham, Barbara Edwardes-Evans and Jim Sandham who are responsible for the name tags were omitted and thanked them. He advised Barry Walker who is responsible for the Bucket Draw was omitted and thanked him. He also asked the deliverers of the *Curlew* to stand and thanked them. **Invasive Fish Species Discovered North of Toronto**

A specimen of rudd, an invasive baitfish originally from Europe, was recently found in Lake Wilcox near Richmond Hill. The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources states that this is the first time this species has been found in an Ontario inland lake. A member of the minnow family, rudd competes with native fish for food and destroys the spawning and nursery habitats of fish like northern pike, muskellunge and yellow perch. It is suspected that this specimen was dumped out of a bait bucket. It is unlawful to use rudd as baitfish in Ontario. Rudd grow to 38 cm and weigh up to 1.8 kg. They can also cross breed with the native golden shiner. They were first discovered in the St. Lawrence River in 1990, and have been found in western Lake Ontario and eastern Lake Erie. The Lake Wilcox specimen has been preserved at the Royal Ontario Museum for further study.

## OWL BANDING AT CANDLEWICK WOODS - 2005

This was the ninth year of owl banding at Candlewick Woods. The 40 Northern Saw-whet Owls banded were even fewer than last year and the lowest total since 1998.

Candlewick Woods is a small woodlot on the north shore of Lake Ontario about 4 km west of Port Hope. On 10 nights between October 8 and October 29, banding attempts were made, resulting in 34.75 hours of effort. This was even less than last year's totals of 45 hours over 12 nights.

As in previous years, the owls were attracted into the nets using a tape recording of Northern Saw-whet Owl calls. The calls were broadcast from a speaker hung about 6.5 feet up a white cedar tree, which was surrounded by a triangle of 3 2 3/8" mesh 40' mist nets.

This season's low total was due to generally poor weather, with many rainy/windy nights, as well as a general lack of effort of the bander.

This year's saw-whet flight was rather a late one. Candlewick didn't catch its first owl until October 8. This late arrival of saw-whets was observed at most owl banding stations in north-eastern North America. At Prince Edward Point, the migration was about 2 weeks later than it had been in 2004.

The peak night at Candlewick occurred on October 19/20 when 15 Northern Saw-whet Owls were banded.

Like last year, a higher than usual number of adult birds were moving. This year, 48% of the owls captured were After-hatch-year (54% in 2004). Most other Ontario stations reported a similar age ratio. However, many east coast stations reported a much higher percentage of hatch-year birds, indicating better breeding success in the Maritimes and northern New England.

The sex ratio was also similar to last year, with 63% females, 10% males, and 27% unknown. Last season's ratio was 65% fe-

male, 7% male, and 28% unknown.

This year, one Candlewick banded bird was recovered elsewhere. NSWO #1204-27371 was banded on October 23, 2003 and was recaptured at Prince Edward Point Bird Observatory on October 20, 2005. The following night, it was recaptured at Elmbrook, Ontario north of Picton! This is the second time a Candlewick banded bird has been recaptured twice.

No other species of owls were banded this year. Great Horned Owls were heard only a few times during the season. On the night of October 8, the banders were treated to a fantastic view of a Long-eared Owl sitting in the laneway. This bird would not move until the car's horn was sounded! On another evening, a visitor was also treated to a Short-eared owl in the laneway.

Thanks to Graydon Bowman for help in erecting the nets at the beginning of the season. Thanks to Graydon and Elizabeth Kellogg for taking the nets down at the end of the season.

And finally, thanks to Bob Sculthorpe for the use of Candlewick Woods for this project.

### Can I Plant Milkweed in My Garden?

As long as the population of milkweed planted doesn't negatively affect agricultural or horticultural land by spreading seed and new vegetative plant material (i.e. root stock) into fields, nurseries or greenhouses then it is acceptable to plant milkweed in your garden. It is recommended that you consult with your local weed inspector and/or neighbours so that all parties involved are comfortable that the impact to agriculture or horticulture is negligible.

## Mid-Winter Waterfowl Inventory, 2006

On January 8, 2006, six members of Willow Beach Field Naturalists participated in the Lake Ontario Mid-Winter Waterfowl Inventory. Participants were Roger Frost, Ben Walters, Elizabeth Kellogg, Kyle Horner, Clive Goodwin and Lori Wensley.

This count is an inventory of waterfowl seen from the Ontario shore of Lake Ontario. Our group was responsible to cover the lake-shore from Wicklow Beach in the east to Wesleyville in the west.

The weather was mild with little wind, which made counting ducks on the lake easy. In total, 3,946 birds of 14 species were counted. As well, 122 unidentified ducks were counted.

Low totals of Canada Goose and Mallard are probably the result of the open conditions on count day. Many of these two species were probably inland foraging in grain fields. The lower than usual number of Common Goldeneye and Long-tailed Duck are harder to explain, with such good counting weather.

The Doug Tarry Young Ornithologists' Workshop (YOW) occurs annually each summer at Long Point Bird Observatory (LPBO). The goal of the Doug Tarry Bird Study Award is to foster the interests and development of ornithology in Canadian teenagers. Recipients of the award attend a ten day ornithological workshop/natural history camp at LPBO, located along the north shore of Lake Erie, Ontario, the the Long Point World Biosphere Reserve.

The Doug Tarry Young Ornithologists' Workshop is a major component of the observatory's educational programs. Many of Canada's talented biologists got their start through the YOW since its inception in the mid 1970s. Thanks to the foresight and generosity of humanitarian and naturalist Doug Tarry, the Workshop is free for selected applicants.

The workshop focuses on "hands-on" learning and training in field ornithology. It provides a unique opportunity for like-minded teenagers to enhance their knowledge and skills in the scientific study and aesthetic enjoyment of birds. Participants learn how to identify, age and sex birds, and how scientists study populations and behaviour. Careful and skilled instructors teach bird handling and handling techniques, how to prepare specimens for scientific study and bird census techniques. Regularly scheduled afternoon field trips to places of biological interest within the Biosphere introduce participants to the flora and fauna of the regions. Evening programs include slide presentations and nocturnal fieldwork.

Space is limited to six participants, ranging in age from 13-17 years old. The Award covers all direct costs of the workshop (accommodation, meals, travel while at Long Point, and professional instruction). Recipients are responsible for their own transportation to and from Long Point, though a small travel grant may be available.
