BRAND CREEK BANDING - FALL 2005

This was the second fall for this project of the Willow Beach Banding Group. Again, 3 mist nets were set up in the brush along Brand Creek behind the home of Alison Elliott and Ben Walters, just west of Port Hope.

In order to catch some of the early fall migrants, the nets were erected on August 1st, but not run until August 6. The first bird of the season was an American Robin. This was only one of 6 birds banded that day. August was rather slow banding, with only 84 birds banded in 12 days of coverage. The "peak" was 11 birds on August 16. Most of the birds banded in August were likely local breeders with only a few migrant warblers and flycatchers banded.

By early September, banding had picked up as more migrant birds began to arrive. Banding totals continued to improve through September to a high of 64 birds on September 27. This big increase in banding totals through the month was due to the arrival of migrant sparrows. Principally, these were White-throated Sparrows, but included good numbers of White-crowned and Song Sparrows as well.

Greatly aiding this increase in banding totals was the addition of a fourth net in a weed patch next to the soybean field, adjacent to Alison and Ben's house. We had noticed that many of the sparrows that were feeding in the field would take cover in this patch of weeds along the fence. The rest of the season, this net was to prove very productive. On some days it caught well over half of the birds!

September produced a total of 353 birds banded, in the 17 days that were covered. This total included many highlights:

- Yellow-bellied Sapsucker - the station's first
- 12 Rose-breasted Grosbeak - none last fall!
- 5 Indigo Bunting - the station's first
- 1 Scarlet Tanager - the station's first

- 1 Blue-headed Vireo
- 1 Tennessee Warbler
- 2 Northern Parula - the station's first
- 3 Mourning Warblers - the station's first

The most unusual bird captured was a hatch year female on Hooded Warbler, caught by Elizabeth Kellogg September 16. Because of new provincial legislation regarding endangered species, this bird could not be banded. The Bird Banding Office of CWS is working with the province to get this ruling changed to recognize incidental catch of Ontario listed endangered species of birds and to permit banding if they happen to be caught. We hope that rule changes before we catch another unusual species.

Banding totals continued to be good throughout October. Again, they were dominated by sparrows, but included a fair number of both Golden- and Ruby-crowned Kinglets, "Myrtle" Warblers and Black-capped Chickadees. The peak occurred on October 21 when 70 birds of 14 species were banded. Half of this total was White-throated Sparrows! However, the total also included 2 Eastern Phoebe, 1 Hermit Thrush, 2 Field Sparrows, 12 White-crowned Sparrows, 1 Northern Cardinal and 1 Clay-colored Sparrow.

Banding continued until November 2, with good numbers of birds being caught right to the end of the season. On the last day, 25 birds of 10 species, including 2 Purple Finches, were banded.

Overall, 767 birds of 55 species were banded. In addition about 130 species were observed at the banding station during the season. Highlights included Purple Martin, Cliff Swallow, Blackbilled Cuckoo, Wild Turkey, Merlin, Peregrine Falcon, Grasshopper Sparrow, Yellow Throated Vireo, Northern Shrike and Pine Warbler.

TEXAS BIRDING JUNKET

(+ bobcats, armadillos, dolphins, alligators, wild hogs, etc.)

Texas in February. Two weeks. Birds! Birds! FANTASTIC.

I WENT ALONG. Flew to Houston, then drove, stopping often, down the Gulf Coast to the Rio Grande.

Following a trail of birding hotspots in a book "Exploring The Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail" (Open Air Books, Toronto Street, Toronto).

Saw 176 species including 14 raptors, 21 of the possible 26 shorebirds, 7 woodpeckers, 3 orioles, 3 thrashers, 2 robins, etc. Orange-crowned Warblers and Loggerhead Shrikes are ubiquitous. Saw many lifers at feeders and bird blinds (wonderful invention!) in places like Bentsen State Park, the De Swim feeders at Salineno (don't miss it) - Bewick's Wren, Brown Jays, Clay-colored Robins, etc!, and Santa Ana State Park, etc.

Special Highlights - the Whooping Cranes at Aransas Wildlife Refuge. Take the \$30 half day boat tour out of Fulton (the Molly Anna is best). It will get you within 100 yards of these beauties.

The best water birds I've ever seen including Cinnamon Teal, Black-bellied Whistling Ducks, Black-necked Stilts, avocets, Clapper Rails, 4 egrets, willets, dowitchers, herons, ibis's, etc, etc. at the Port Aransas Birding Centre.

Texas road signs are atrocious! Buy good maps and expect to have to stop for directions sometimes. And, buy a map of Brownsville + Harlingen. Some good birds here but very easy to get lost. Lots of highway construction.

Texas is fields. And in them watch for Sprague's Pipit, Sandhill Cranes (many), Snow and Ross's Goose, bobwhites, Long-billed Curlew (many), hawks galore, etc.

Gas and food and motels are cheap in February (\$30 at Days Inn on Sable Island for example. Best Western on the Rio Grande \$55). Fill the tank for \$20. Eat like a pig at Taco Belle for \$7. And most parks charge \$3.

Watch out for cowboys and chuckwagons on the highways.

If you go, the web has lots. Google on Great Texan Coastal Birding Trail.

Fisher Tracks Discovered at Presqu'ile Provincial Park

The Fisher (*Martes pennanti*) is the second largest member of the weasel family found in Ontario. Fishers are nocturnal, very secretive and rarely seen by humans. They are famous for their ability to successfully hunt and kill porcupines.

This species has expanded from its historical range. Eight years ago, one was found in Prince Edward County. A number of sightings have been made at Presqu'ile Provincial Park, but these reports were not substantiated by photographs or other evidence. On February 15/06, Park staff, arriving for work, discovered very definitive tracks of a Fisher in the parking lot, garbage area and forest edge. As Fishers require a large territory, there may not be a resident Fisher in the park.

KEEP MOTORS OUT OF ONTARIO'S WILDERNESS PARKS

Draft Parks and Conservation Reserves Act for Ontario opens wilderness parks to motorized uses.

Ontario's Bill 11 2005, *An Act to enact the Provincial Parks and Conservation Reserves Act* is opening the door to motorized uses in Ontario's wilderness parks! The draft Act received its first reading in the Legislature in the fall of 2005, with a second review expected later this spring.

Although there are important changes being made to improve the protection of Ontario's provincial parks from industrial activities, some amendments do not bode well for the future of wilderness in the province.

With a change to the definition of wilderness parks objectives, the new legislation will permit motorized uses (e.g. snowmobiles, ATVS, float planes, motorboats and personal watercraft) in Ontario's last, undeveloped wilderness areas.

If you have ever enjoyed the solitude of Ontario's beloved wilderness parks like Quetico, Wabikimi, Woodland Caribou, Temagami and others - now is the time to take action. You can make a difference!

LET THE MINISTER OF NATURAL RESOURCES, DAVID RAMSAY, KNOW THAT MOTORIZED ACCESS SHOULD BE PROHIBITED IN ONTARIO'S WILDERNESS PARKS.

Original Definition:

(Source: Ontario Provincial Parks - Planning and Management Policies, 1992 Update)

*Wilderness parks are substantial areas where the forces of nature are permitted to function freely and where **visitors travel by non-mechanized means** and experience expansive solitude, challenge and personal integration with nature.*

New Definition:

(Source: First Reading, Bill 11 2005)

*The objective of wilderness class parks is to protect large areas where the forces of nature can exist freely and **visitors travel primarily by non-motorized means** while engaging in low-impact recreation to experience solitude, challenge and integration with nature.*
